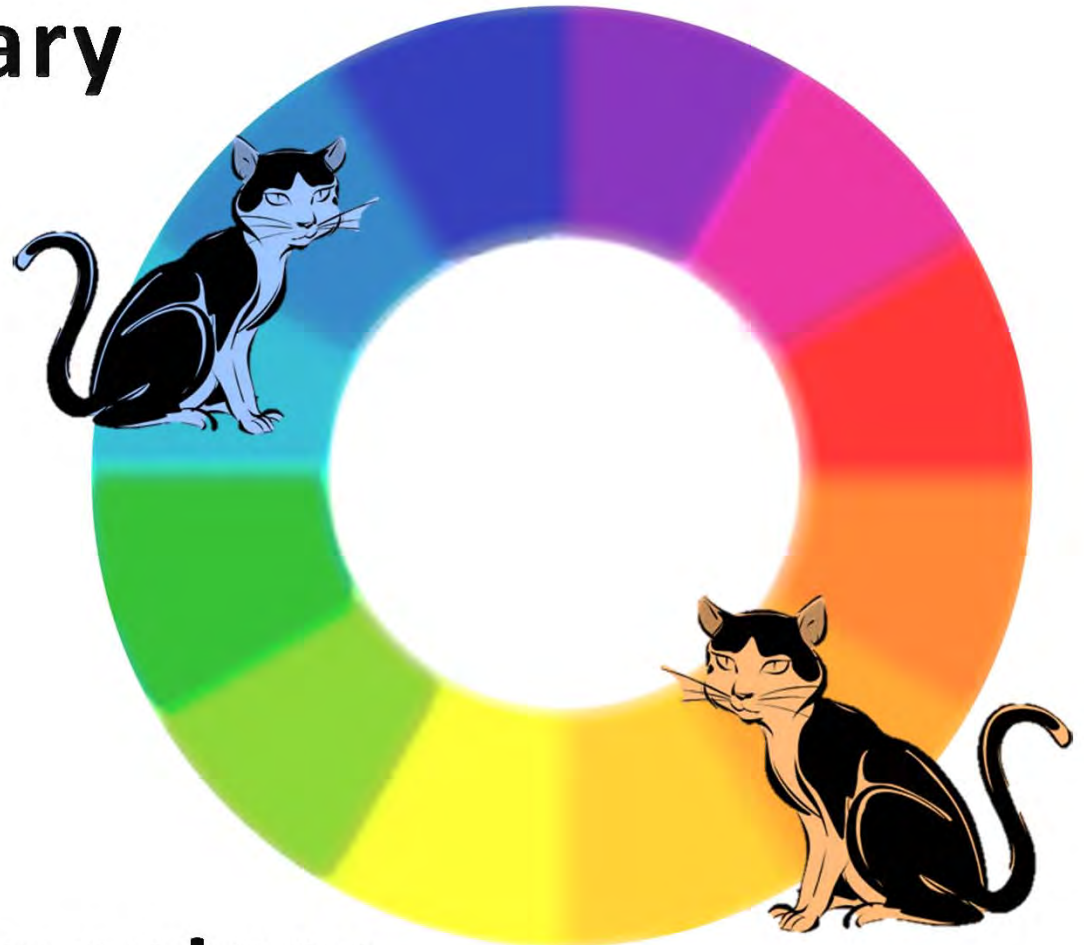

High Contrast of these colors create a vibrant look, especially at high saturation.

← opposites →

Works well when you want something to stand out.



- Can be jarring and unsuitable in large doses.
- Bad for **Text**

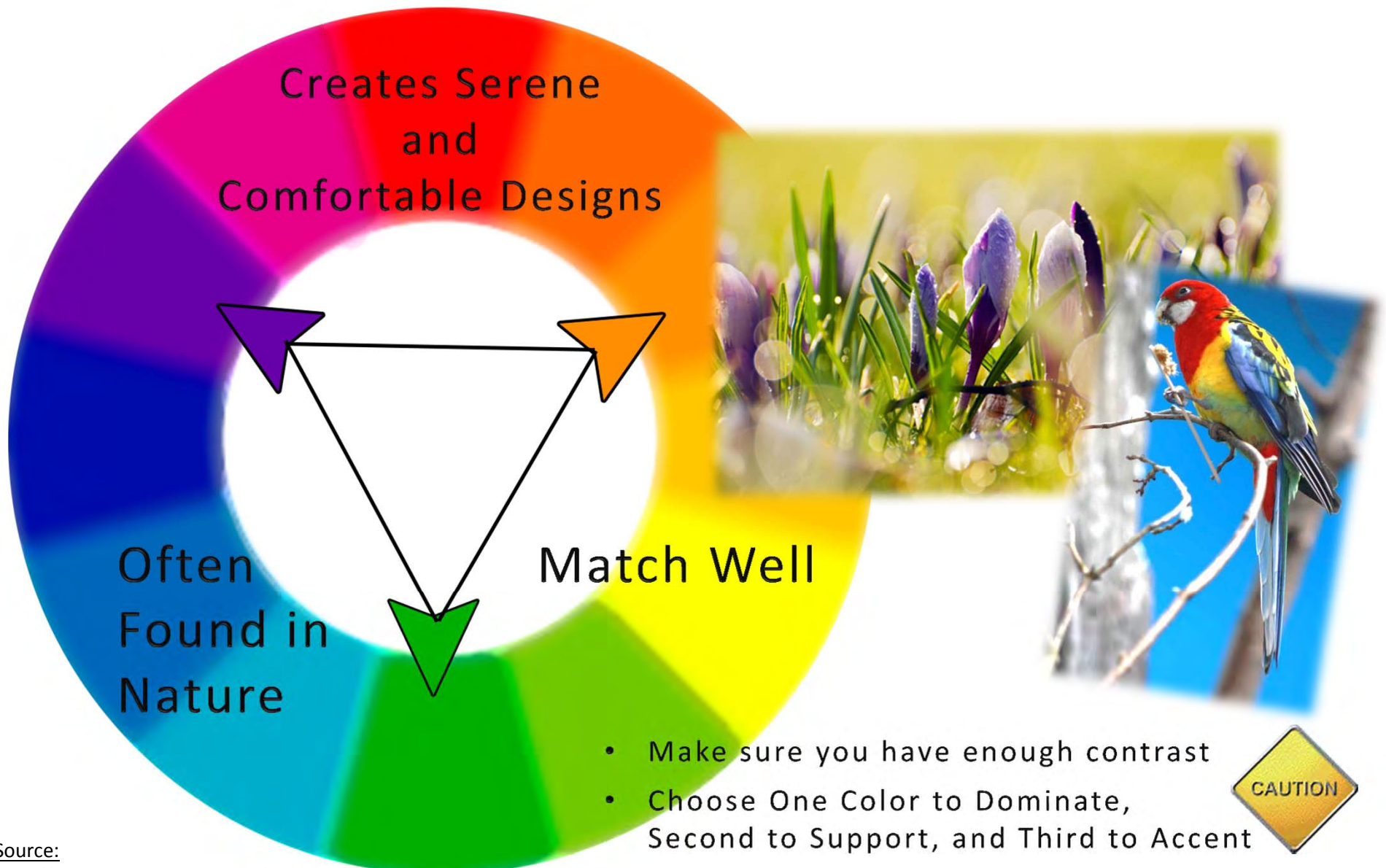
Choose One Color to Dominate,

- Offers Plenty of Possibilities for Variation



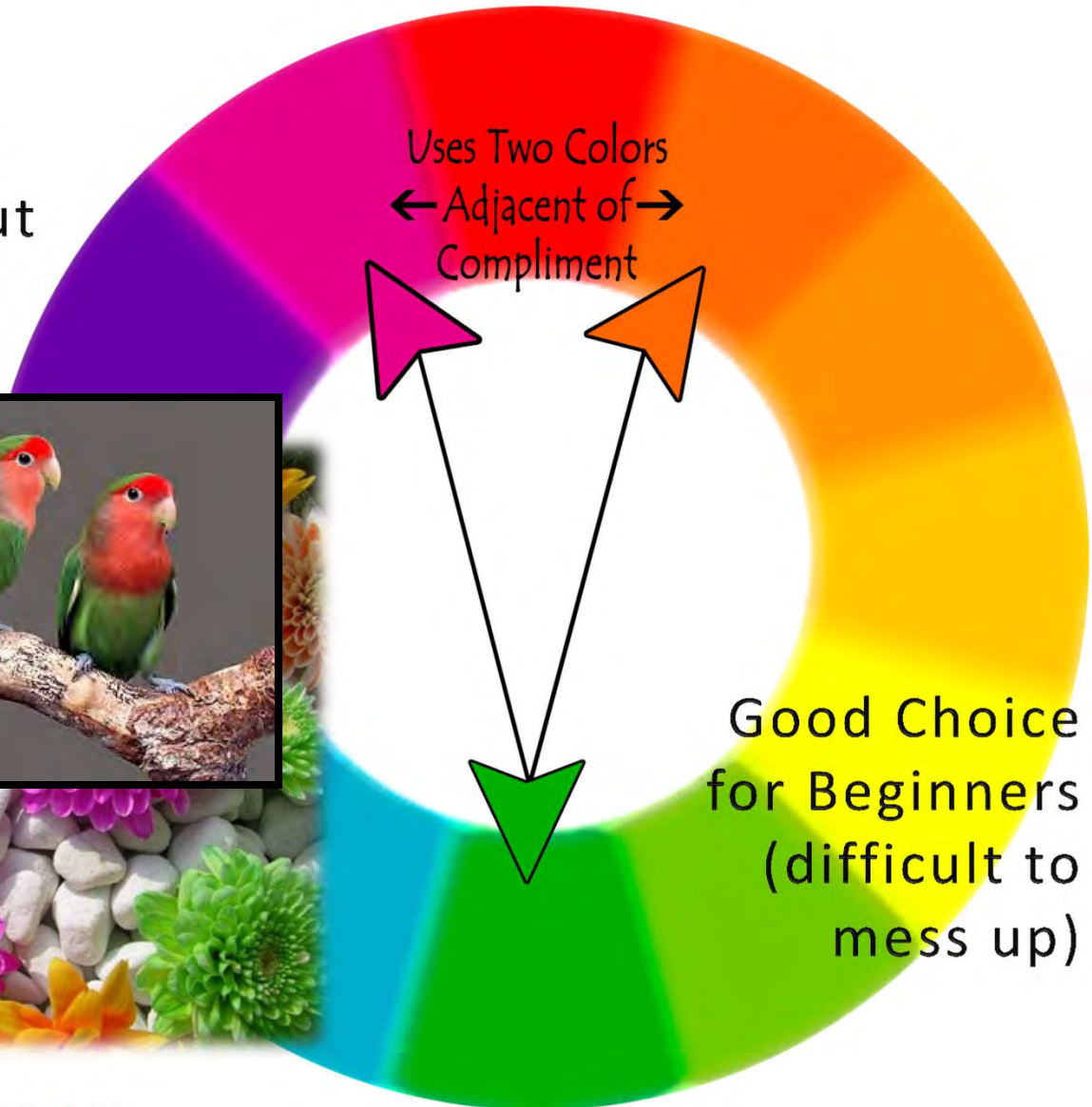
- Works Best if One Color Dominates

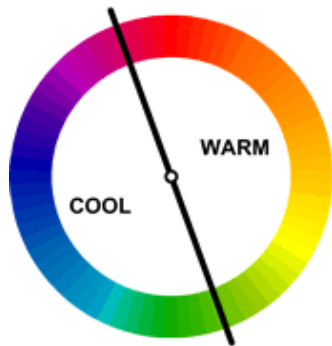

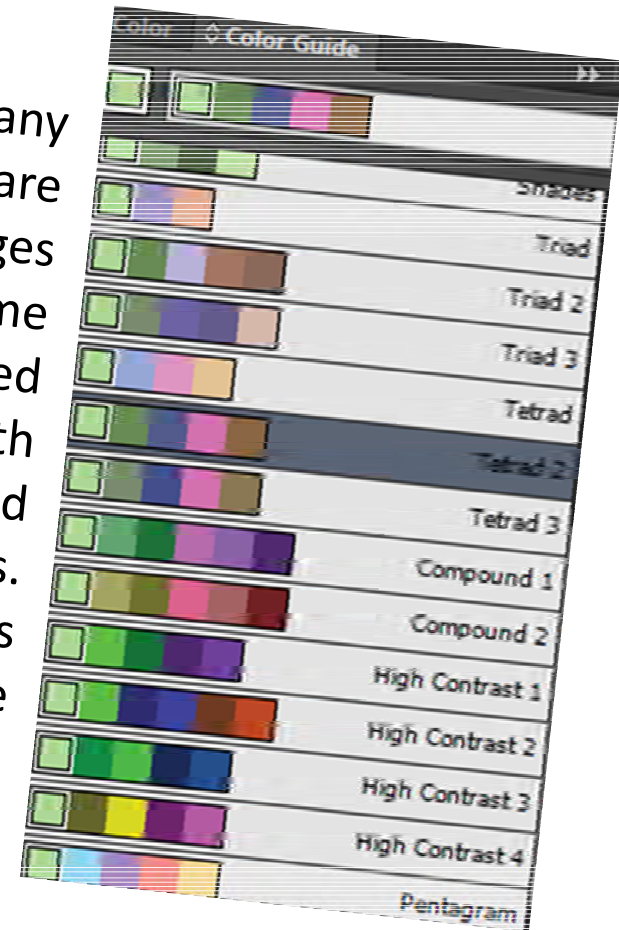
